Continuing with our theme of Pilgrimage, what do we show on our cover? The Shrine of our Lady of Walsingham: then and now. Pilgrimage has rightly been called 'An ancient tradition in tune with today's needs', as testified to by the growing popularity of Pilgrimage Tourism in recent years. Christianity has a strong and ancient tradition of pilgrimage, both to sites relevant to the New Testament narrative (especially in the Holy Land) and to sites associated with later saints or miracles, both to be found at The Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham. In 1061, so the story goes, Richeldis, the devout lady of the manor of Little Walsingham in Norfolk, prayed to our Lady asking how she could honour her in some special way. In answer to this prayer, Mary led Richeldis in spirit to Nazareth and showed her the house in which she had first received the angel's message. Mary told Richeldis to take the measurements of this house and build another one just like it in Walsingham. This was the era of the crusades, a perilous time for pilgrims to the Holy Land. But now pilgrims need not attempt the dangerous journey; for, in Norfolk, here was a 'new Nazareth'. Moreover, Mary is said to have promised Richeldis, "Whoever seeks my help there will not go away emptyhanded." Shortly after, a spring of water sprang up just where the shrine was being built and Richeldis had it made into a well. Pilgrims thereafter would make their way to the Holy House to light their candles and to pray; then, walk on to the well, drink some water and pray for healing. Just as pilgrims do today. Walsingham became renown as a place of healing, be it physical, mental or spiritual healing being sought by the pilgrim. Then, as now, people go on pilarimage for as many reasons as there are pilarims. Often, people go on pilarimage when they are at a crossroads in their lives, when undergoing a change in their life's direction or relationships. Others may be in search of a deeper spirituality, of healing and forgiveness. Or it may be an occasion for giving thanks. Pilgrimage offers to all an opportunity to set aside time for God and to discern God's will for them. In the course of time, the Holy House became part of a mighty abbey, the remains of which, shown on the right of the photograph, give an idea of the spectacular building it must once have been. It was destroyed at the Dissolution of the Monasteries. The centuries passed by: then, in 1921, a new Vicar, Father Alfred Hope Patten, was appointed to Walsingham. It was his idea to create a new statue of Our Lady of Walsingham based on the image depicted on the seal of the medieval shrine (shown on the left in the photo). In 1922 the statue was set up in the Parish Church of St Mary and regular pilarimage devotion followed. Throughout the 1920s the trickle of pilarims became a flood. until, in 1931, a new Holy House was built and encased in a small pilgrimage church. In 1938 that church was enlarged to form the Anglican Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham, Hopefully, next July, coronavirus permitting a coachload of pilgrims from the Diocese of Bangor will once again travel 'The Walsingham Way.' Grateful thanks to Jane Bailey, who has been a pilgrim for many years, both for this text and the superb cover image.
