What do we show on this month's cover? St David's, in the Morawelon area of Holyhead, built in the early 1960s, was intended to be multi-purpose. This beautiful, simple sanctuary is the only part of the building which is consecrated, and is separated by a wooden screen from the communally used parts. Many people socially use the hall, the kitchen and the toilets, but the screen is only opened for services. We know that St David is the patron saint of Wales, but who was he? Most of the information we have about him comes from a biography written five hundred years after his death. It might be considered legendary, but definitely inspirational! Thirty years before he was born, an angel foretold his birth to St Patrick. David was reputedly born around the year 500 during a wild thunderstorm, on the Pembrokeshire cliffs near the present day city of St Davids. His father was king of Ceredigion; his mother was Non, the daughter of a local chieftain. Her sister was Gwen, the mother of St Cybi. Non left her family and gave birth by the sea. So intense was the birth that her fingers left marks where she grasped the rocks. As David was born, a bolt of lightning split the rock in two. After the seduction, she became a nun. David was baptised by Saint Elvis of Munster. It is said that a blind man was afterwards cured by the water used for the baptism. More miracles followed. David was said to have brought a child back to life by splashing the boy's face with tears. Educated at a monastery, near the present St David's Cathedral, his tutor was Paulinus a blind monk. David cured him of his blindness, before becoming a monk missionary, travelling through Wales and to south west England and Brittany to spread Christianity among the pagans. He apparently visited Rome and Jerusalem, where he was made archbishop. His most famous miracle occurred while preaching in a village on flat land. Some found it difficult to see him and hear the sermon. A white dove, the symbol of the Holy Spirit, landed on his shoulder. The ground where he stood then rose up to form a hill, so that everyone could see and hear him. The dove became St David's emblem, and now a church stands on the crest of that special hill. He founded twelve monasteries and life within was austere. Only vegetables, bread, milk and water were consumed. Silence was the norm, except for prayer or in an emergency. David would not allow monks to make animals work for them, but made them pull the plough themselves. His holiness and personal charisma were enough to hold the community together in the service of God. His last sermon to his monks bade them "Do the little things, the small things you've seen me doing". His saint's day has been celebrated annually on 1 March since the 12<sup>th</sup> century. He is believed to have died on this day in 589, and was buried in the grounds of his own monastery at St Davids, Pembrokeshire, which he allegedly founded in 560. **Interesting historical March dates!** On the 3<sup>rd</sup> telephone inventor Alexander Graham Bell (1847-1922) was born in Edinburgh, Scotland. He and his father were involved in teaching deaf persons to speak, and developed an interest in the vibrating membrane as a method of electrically transmitting sounds. The newly invented telephone was first used on March 10, 1876. On the 4th in 1681 - King Charles II of England granted a huge tract of land in the New World to William Penn to settle an outstanding debt. The area later became Pennsylvania. On the 6<sup>th</sup> -Renaissance genius Michelangelo (1475-1564) was born in Caprese, Italy. He was a painter, sculptor, architect, poet and visionary best known for his fresco on the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel and his sculptures of David and The Pieta. On the 9th in 1074, Pope Gregory excommunicated all married priests. On the 15th in 44 B.C. - Julius Caesar was assassinated by stabbing in the Senate chamber in Rome by Brutus and fellow conspirators. On the 17th is Saint Patrick's Day commemorating the patron saint of Ireland. On the 21st - organist and composer Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) was born in Eissenach, Germany. His output included thousands of compositions, many used in churches. Among his best known works are the St. John and St. Matthew passions. On the 25th in 1807 - The British Parliament abolished the slave trade following a long campaign against it by Ouakers and others. On the 31<sup>st</sup> - Franz Joseph Haydn (1732-1809) was born in Rohrau, Austria. His works include 107 symphonies, 84 string quartets, 58 piano sonatas, and 13 masses. Based in Vienna, Mozart was his friend and Beethoven was a pupil. On the 31st in 1855, Charlotte Bronte, reclusive Yorkshire author of 'Jane Eyre', died aged thirty eight, from tuberculosis.
