What do we show on this month's cover? Appropriately for Easter, a marble sculpture of "The Veiled Christ." Created in 1753, by Giuseppe Sanmartino, it is to be found in the Cappella Sansevero in Naples, Italy. It is considered to be one of the world's most remarkable works of art. A contemporary sculptor said that he would willingly give up ten years of his life, to be able to produce a similar masterpiece! The "job description" was "to produce a marble statue, sculpted with the greatest realism, representing Our Lord Jesus Christ in death, covered by a transparent shroud, carved from the same block of stone as the statue". The commission was completed - the dead Christ laid on a couch, covered by a veil which adhered perfectly to his form. The exquisite mastery of the sculptor, results in us looking through the veil, at the suffering that Christ had undergone during the crucifixion. The signs of his pain can be seen on his face and body. Unfortunately, I have not had the pleasure of visiting it, but Venetian architect, historian and art critic Francesco da Mosto describes how the face changes when viewed from different angles – initially it shows suffering, then moves on to depict peace! Magnificent! Also on the couch, we see the carved instruments of his passion: pliers, shackles and the crown of thorns. Over time, the sculpture was legendarily believed to have been achieved by alchemy. Viewers could not believe that the veil and the body were carved out of the one original marble piece. It was believed that a real veil was laid over the half finished statue, and that it was transformed into the finished product of crystalline marble, by the chemical process of alchemy. A close professional analysis leaves no doubt as to its authenticity. A confirmatory receipt, dated 1752, signed by the commissioning prince Raimondo di Sangro, seventh Prince of Sansevero, is preserved to this day in the archives of the Bank of Naples. He also authenticated in other signed letters, the statue to be of genuine marble, and carved from one piece!

Facts about crucifixion: This manner of death can be traced back to 6 centuries before Christ. While artists have depicted Christ hanging on the cross with his face in a peaceful repose, it is actually an extremely painful manner of death. The word excruciating comes directly from the word crucifixion. Nails shown to be driven through the palms are allegedly historically incorrect. They would generally have been driven through the wrists, hitting the median nerve, which is extremely painful. Insects irritating the wounds would increase the discomfort.

Some modern Easter traditions which still exist! Philippines: On Good Friday some of the faithful in the town of San Pedro actually endure crucifixion as well as flagellation with sharp-tipped whips. (They do not last long enough to cause serious injury or death!) In Cyprus and Crete, it is usual to light bonfires, and a small doll representing Judas Iscariot is thrown into the flames. In western Switzerland women carry crimson cushions, bearing the symbols of Christ's passion, through the streets. The cushion contains nails used in the crucifixion, the crown of thorns that was placed on His head and the handkerchief that St. Veronica used to wipe Christ's brow as He carried the cross (which was also incredibly imprinted with the image of His face).
