

What do we show on this month's cover and why? According to the rise in viewers of TV History programs, interest in the past is becoming a bolt hole, possibly as an escape from the horrors of the present day world! Following on from last month's look at the Roman army, and its stay on Anglesey, the modern world might think its current technical and lifestyle innnovations are phenomenal. But we shall consider this month, ancient Roman inventions that have shaped the modern world and are still part of our daily lives today, nearly two thousand years on! Sit back, relax and prepare to be amazed! Although they did not use central heating, they used methods other than fireplaces to keep warm. Our cover shows their innovative under floor heating system, which can be seen at the Roman Fort and Museum, Hadrians Wall, near Hexham, Northumberland. Raised floors, laid on columns, allowed hot air to circulate. Fires would be lit in stoke-holes, and produced underfloor heating. In bath-houses gaps were even left, when tiling a wall, so that the walls would be heated too. With 10,000 soldiers on the move in Britain, tasty, convenient "food to go" was an absolute necessity. Street food sellers were both important and commonplace in large towns. Advertising, public relations and marketing all trace their origins to Roman times. Traders used billboards, and even the emperor would self promote his latest victories on newly minted coins. Potters would stamp their names on their wares as a mark of quality. Evidence of this exists from southern France dated between 70 -85 AD. The idea of keeping towns and forts clean through drainage and fresh water was completely alien to the British way of life. Aqueducts to bring fresh water in, and drains to keep streets and houses clean were both great feats of engineering left as a legacy from Roman times. Remains of latrines and bath complexes can still be seen across the forts of Hadrian's Wall, considered to be the best preserved in the country. Large settlements of course, existed pre Roman times, but they were the first to produce the concept of an organised "town" or a planned administrative centre. London, Bath and Lincoln are excellent examples to visit today. People in the Iron Age built buildings in a round shape from wood, but the Romans were the first to build in stone - in straight lines and on a grand scale! Roman roads were built wide and straight, with paved streets - many still form the basis of roads today! In total, they built 55,000 miles of roads throughout Europe and the Mediterranean. Julius Caesar created the Julian calendar in 45 BC, consisting of 365 days, with a leap year every fourth year, aligning the Roman calendar with the sun. He also moved the beginning of the year from 1st March to 1st January! July and August were named to reflect the emperors Julius and Augustus. Roman currency meant that a coin minted in Rome could be spent universally throughout the empire - in Britain, North Africa or Turkey. Such a widespread global currency has not been seen since- until the Euro! The introduction of Latin had a profound impact on words and language within Britain. Latin became the language of religion, law and administration, and a great many modern words still derive from this language. Plumbing is so called because the Romans made their pipes out of lead (plumbum.) I hope you will appreciate two quotes from Marcus Aurelius - Roman emperor and Stoic philosopher -161-180 AD: "You have power over your mind — not over outside events" and 'Everything we hear is an opinion, not a fact"

One team member, a professional "digger" for thirty years, has elsewhere unearthed finds from the Neolithic era, approx 5,000 years ago, and was also part of a Roman dig in York. An impressive CV!

We were delighted to learn that Nic Murphy, the new tourism manager for Holyhead council, was able to reinstate the ever popular choirs to entertain visitors and locals within St Cybi. Holyhead Male Voice Choir performed twice, as did the Isle of Anglesey Choral Society. We look forward to return visits, when council finances permit!
